Development Services

- Development decisions and approvals are guided by <u>Zoning By-laws</u> which are based on
 - the Township of Uxbridge Official Plan
 - the Region of Durham Official Plan
- New development in the Uxbridge Urban Area is conditional on the availability of municipal sewage and water services as per the Township Official Plan. The capacity of these services is limited. The Township Sewage Allocation Policy ensures that servicing capacity is allocated to best meet the objectives of the Township.
- Official plan amendments are required to develop land in a way that does not conform to the Official plan.
- In Ontario, all disputed development applications are adjudicated by the Ontario Land Tribunal
- All <u>Current Planning Applications</u> and related filings are on the Township website.

Fire Department

Key Facts:


- The Uxbridge Fire Department has a full-time Chief and full-time Fire Prevention Officer;
 the rest of the positions are part-time, including 40 paid-on-call/"volunteer" fire-fighters.
- One of our firefighting staff are certified to the National Fire Protection Assn (NFPA) standard that applies to their duties eg. Firefighter, Officer, Public Educator, Fire Inspector, Instructor, in addition to additional specialized training in auto extrication, low angle rope rescue, ice/water rescue, driver training/pump operations, emergency first aid/CPR/Defibrillation
- The Divisions in the Fire Department include Administration, Emergency Response, Training, Fire Prevention, Public Education, Mechanical
- The Fire Department has response agreements with surrounding fire departments and emergency medical services.



Fire Department

The Fire Department operates under the Fire Prevention and Protection Act (FPPA)

- The <u>Fire Code</u> and <u>Mandatory Firefighter Certification</u> are regulations under this Act
- The Fire Chief is responsible to Municipal Council and to the Ontario Fire Marshal (OFM)
- Municipal Council determines the level of fire protection services provided by the Fire Department through the Fire Department Establishing and Regulating Bylaw.
- The Fire Department is required to report fire statistics to the Office of the Fire Marshal and the OFM conducts an annual verification of fire department activity



Emergency Management

- Every municipality in Ontario is required to have an <u>emergency planning program</u>.
- The municipal responsibilities are detailed in the Emergency Management and Civil Protection Act (EMCPA).
- The Mayor of the Municipality can declare or terminate a municipal emergency.
- The Municipal Control Group manages declared emergencies within the municipality.
- The Emergency Planning Program, and appointment of members of the Municipal Control Group are authorized by a municipal bylaw.
- The Province (Office of the Fire Marshal and Emergency Management) reviews the municipal emergency planning program annually.
- The Community Emergency Management Coordinator (CEMC) and Public Information Officer (PIO) are appointments made under the EMCPA. In Uxbridge, these positions are held by the Fire Chief and Director of Legislative Services/Clerk, respectively.







2022 Total Township Revenues and Expenditures Budgets




Property Tax 101

This video explains how taxes are calculated and levied.




Some key Points

- The <u>Municipal Property Assessment</u> <u>Corporation (MPAC)</u> assesses property values
- MPAC assessments are usually LOWER than real-estate market assessments or sales
- MPAC has not done a general market reassessment since 2016.
- Reassessments are usually phased in.
- Individual properties are reassessed if there are improvements made to the property or changes in use of the property.
- Residential, commercial and farm properties are three examples of different 'taxation classes'.
- The same tax rate is applied to all properties in the same class
- The same Regional Tax rate is applied to all properties in the same class across the Region.




How Property Tax is Calculated



- (1) your property assessment for year 2022 will be the same as 2021, unless changes have been made to the property.
- (2) deadline to file a Request for Reconsideration with MPAC for your 2022 property assessment was March 31, 2022.


2022 Property Tax Distribution

In the 2020/2021 Ontario Budget, the Province reduced the 2021 Business Education Tax (BET) rates to a rate of 0.88%. In Uxbridge, the 2020 Commercial BET rate was 0.98% (resulting in a decrease of 10%) and the 2020 Industrial BET rate was 1.25% (resulting ina decrease of 30%). While the Township is required to charge and collect BET on behalf of the Province, the Township remits the BET billed to school boards in Durham Region. So the BET rate reduction does not impact local taxes retained by the Township.


2022 Property Taxes by Property Classification


2022 Regional Property Taxes – Average Home






Average Monthly Cost of Services* provided by the Township Per Household




Total Township Asset Values by Category (as of Dec. 31, 2020)





Asset Preservation




COVID-19 Impact on Revenue from Recreation User Fees






Operating Grants 2012-2021



Sources of Capital Grants 2012-2021










- Project started in 2020 and was significantly funded by grants
- The project will renew and improve the economic, physical and social wellbeing of Uxbridge's town centre by:
 - Strengthening local business and encouraging investment by property owners;
 - Creating enjoyable public streets and spaces animated by a variety of creative and civic activities; and,
 - Providing work and living opportunities that fulfil people's needs across a spectrum of ages and interests.
- Council approved the <u>Strategic Plan and an Action Plan</u> in March 2022







Key Facts:


- Funding for the project comes from fundraising, the design of the shelter was done by NASUS.
- The project will be jointly built, owned and managed by the Twp of Scugog and the Twp of Uxbridge.
- Project was tendered for construction and awarded.
- The contractor requested significantly more money for construction.
- The project was placed on hold in 2019 until an alternative solution or agreement could be reached.
- All unspent funds raised remain in escrow for the project.
- Since the project was stalled building costs have increased dramatically.

AQUATIC CENTRE FACTS

PROPOSED UXBRIDGE AQUATIC CENTRE-FACTS

LOCATION

The future site of the proposed aquatic centre is the Fields of Uxbridge which is the Township's "vital destination for leisure and recreation activities". This multi-use recreation site includes a number of soccer fields, skate park, pump park and trails. Future plans include a new baseball diamond and tennis courts. Not only will this site allow for shared use of facilities (and cost savings), it will allow for families to partake in various activities together at the same location.



CURRENT STATE OF UXPOOL

Uxpool was built in 1971 and is almost 50 year old. The facility is at the end of its functional life and will require substantial capital expenditures in the next decades to keep it operational if it is not replaced. Current issues with Uxpool include:

- mechanical equipment is outdated;
- high level of humidity, resulting in mold and rust issues;
- building envelope is not insulated (not energy efficient);
- wall cracks and ongoing issues with the roof;
- 2nd floor is not accessible; and
- does not meet the needs of the community.

The Township Asset Management Plan (AMP) identifies the replacement of Uxpool as it is at the end of its functional life and the cost to maintain the existing facility will become uneconomical.

ABOUT THE CENTRE

This landmark recreation facility will serve residents of the Township of Uxbridge, North Durham and East York Region. The proposed aquatic centre will be approx. 26,000 SF and will include a:

- · 25 metre, 6 lane pool
- Therapy pool
- · Multi-purpose room

COMMUNITY BENEFITS

Therapy Pool— A warmer therapy pool enables specialized programming for seniors and young children who are not well-serviced in the existing pool.

Additional Programming —Additional capacity through a therapy pool enables more programs and programming at more convenient times for residents.

Flexible Programming—The multipurpose room will permit flexible, fourseason recreation options for a variety of user groups.

Accessibility—The proposed aquatic centre will be fully accessible.

Energy Efficient —The proposed aquatic centre will be more environmentally sustainable to operate and will include climate-friendly, environmentally sustainable building features. A new aquatic centre is proposed for the Fields of Uxbridge to replace the aging Uxpool.

The centre is part of the <u>Fields of</u> Uxbridge Master Plan
